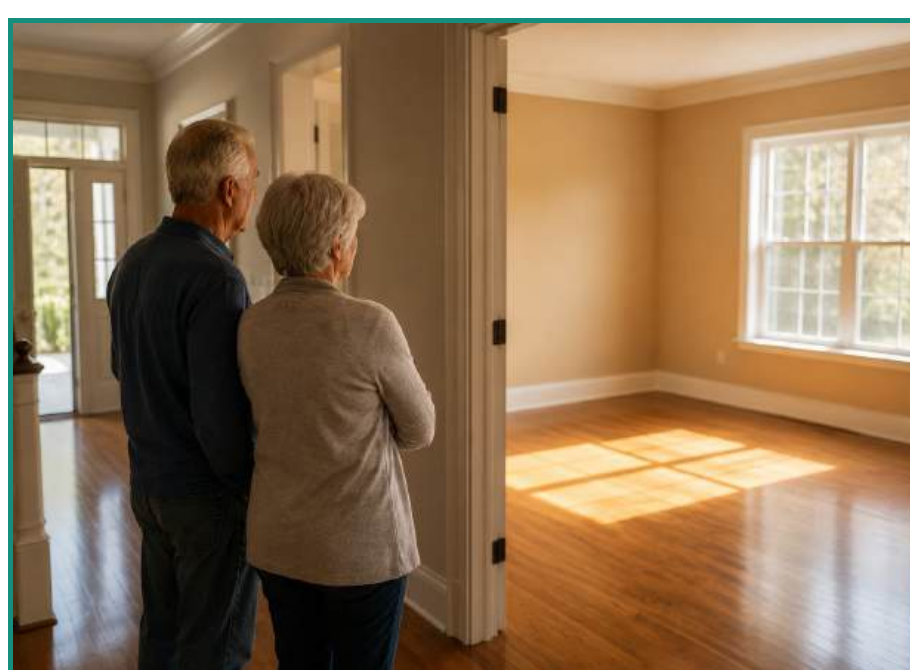


Questions for Retirees Considering a Home Sale

Start by asking whether your home still works for your daily routine, future needs, and budget. A house that once felt perfect may now require more maintenance, money, or physical effort than you want to manage.

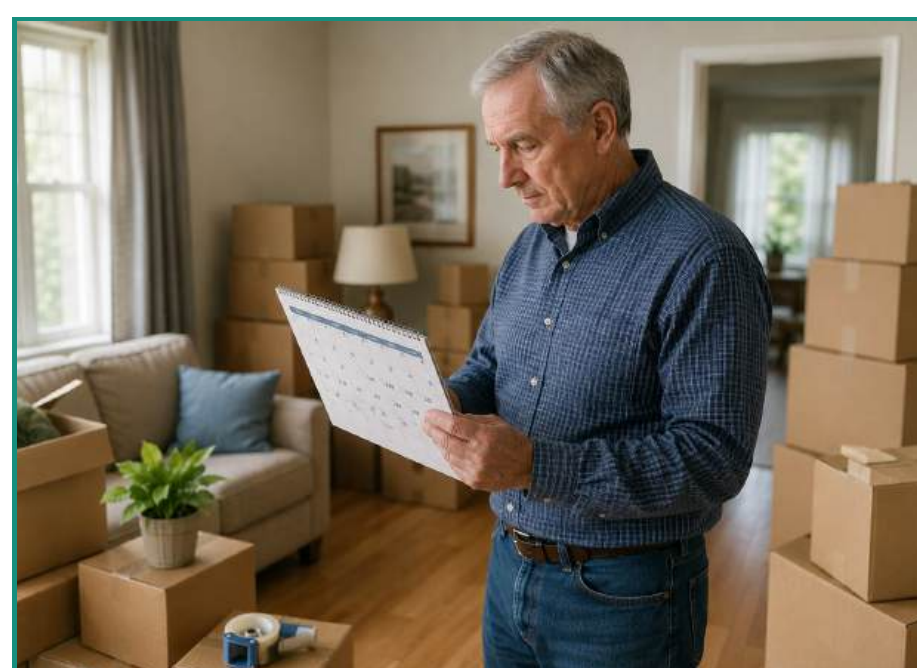


2. What Are You Hoping to Gain by Selling?
